Ultrasound in the Provision of First Trimester Abortion

At the conclusion of this educational session, participants should be able to:

- Be familiar with basic principles of pelvic sonography
- Understand ultrasonographic correlations in normal and abnormal early embryonic development, including ectopic pregnancy
- Have a clear understanding of the uses and limitations of sonography in the provision of first trimester abortions

Professional and Clinical Competencies

- Identify resources for professional and personal support for advancing scope of practice into the prevention and clinical management of unintended pregnancy

Vasectomy: The No-Scalpel Technique and Occlusion Methods

At the conclusion of this educational session, participants should be able to:

- Compare the efficacy, safety, and cost of vasectomy to tubal ligation
- List the basic steps in the no-scalpel vasectomy technique
- List the common occlusion methods in vasectomy
- Discuss common complications of vasectomy
- Appropriately counsel patients on vasectomy

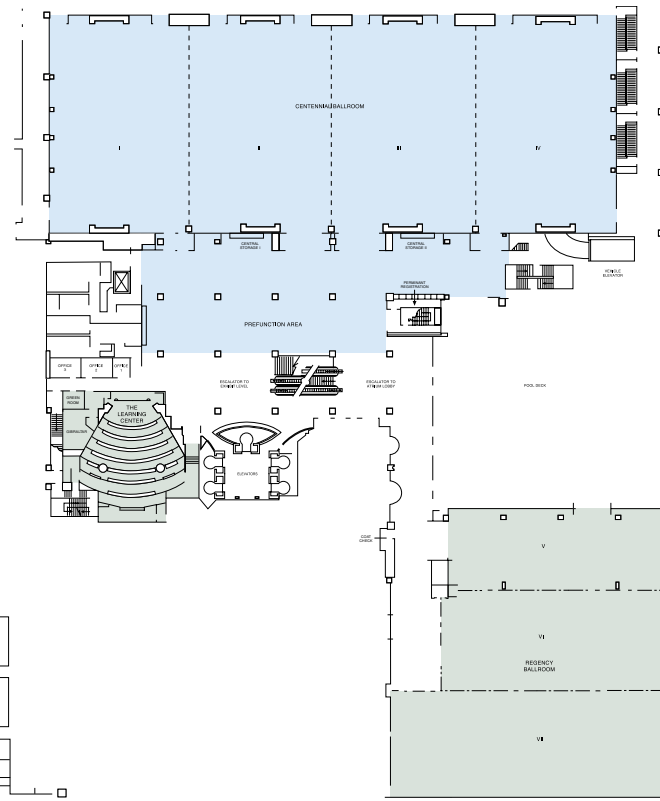
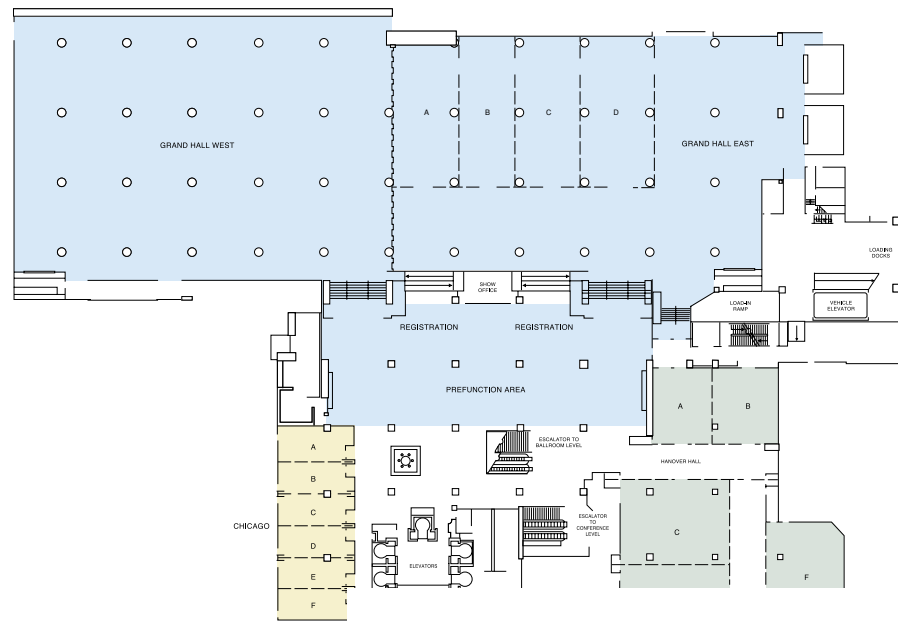
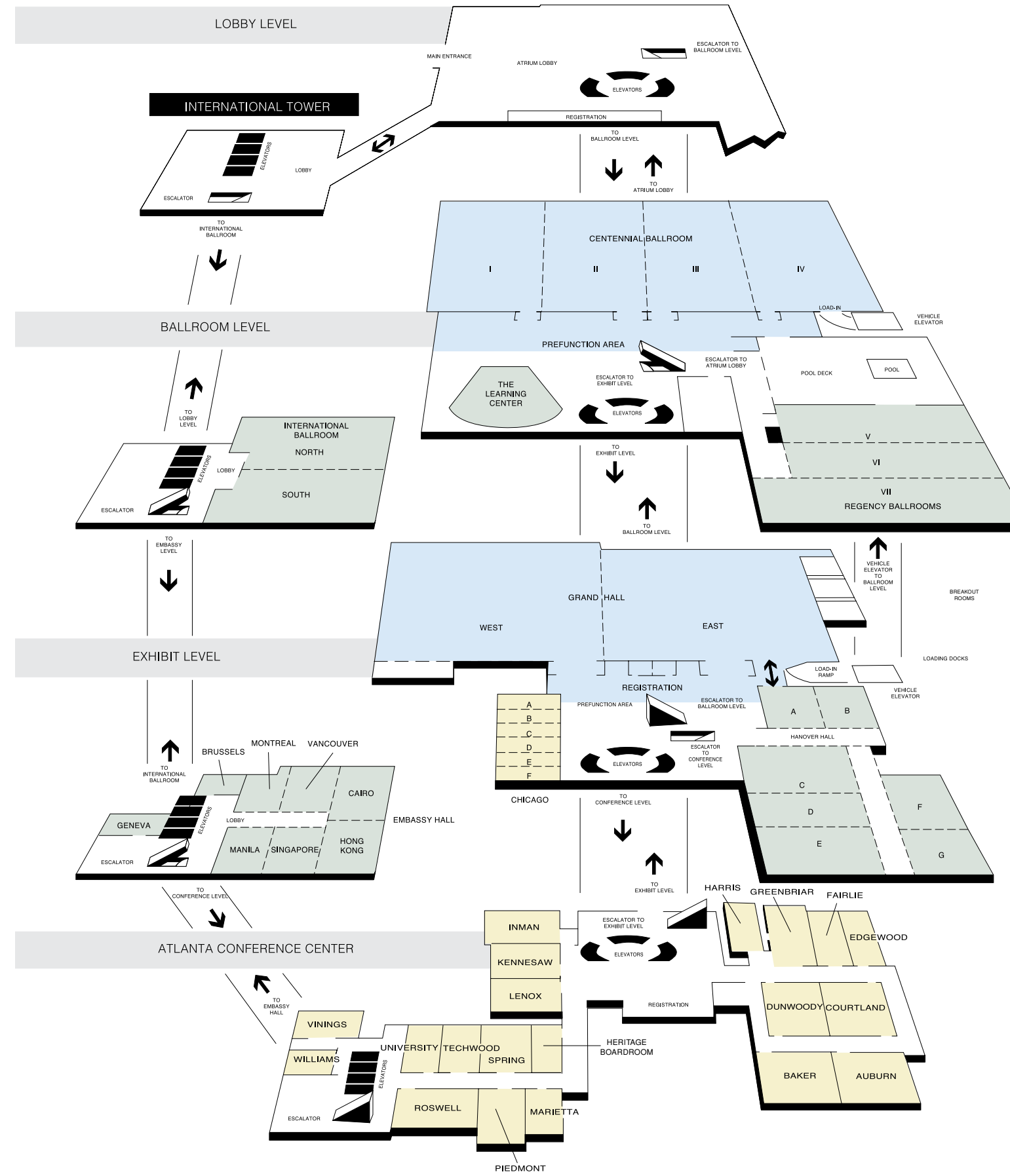


Exhibit Level

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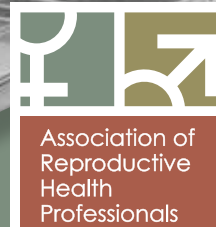
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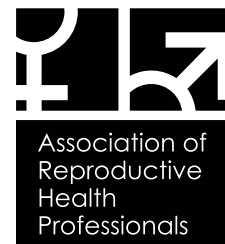
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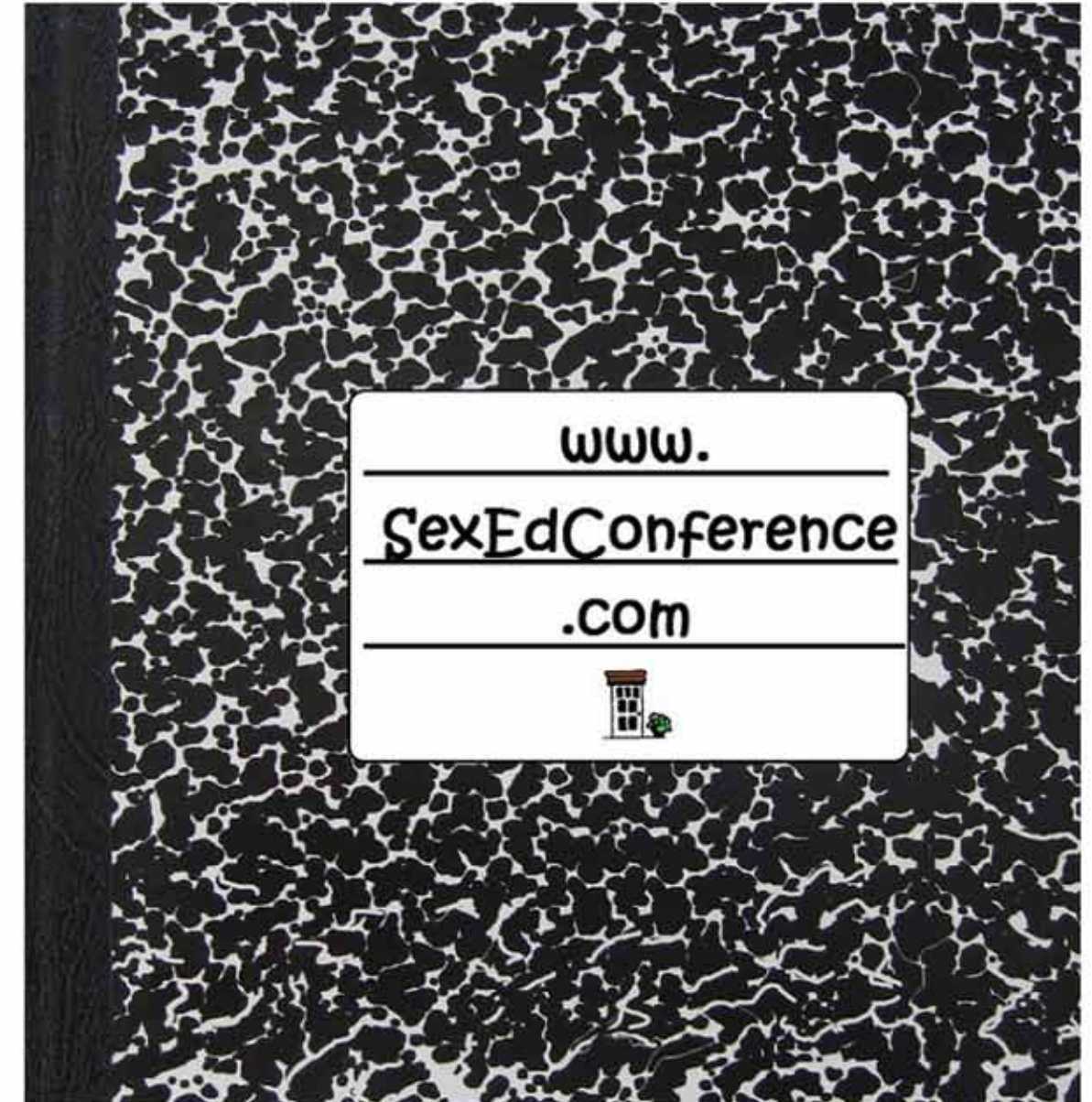
